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# Death Summoned Early Resident of Jackson Vicinity

## Burt E. Cady Suddenly Stricken With Fatal Heart Attack While Vis- iting in Fairmont

Lifetime friends and neighbors in Jackson were shocked Sunday evening when a message was received informing them of the sudden death of Burt E. Cady, at the home of his brother, Frank, in Fairmont, where together with Mrs. Cady and the Earl R. Cady family, they were spending the day.

Mr. and Mrs. Cady were joined by the family of their son, Earl, Sunday forenoon, and together the Cadys motored to Fairmont, where they were invited guests at a dinner served by the brother and sister-in-law of Mr. Cady, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cady. The three families spent a most delightful afternoon, but just as supper was announced Mr. Cady suffered a fatal heart attack and died almost instantly.

Burt E. Cady was a familiar figure in the Jackson community where he had spent his entire life, the past 43 years being employed in the C. L. Coleman, lumber yard which is now conducted by the J. F. Anderson company. Patrons respected Mr. Cady because of his sterling honesty and kindly mannerisms, and his always ready willingness to serve in any capacity that builded a better Jackson, and his presence both in the Anderson yard as well as in the Jackson community, will be greatly missed.

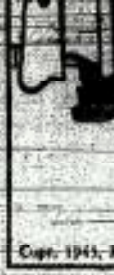
Burt E. Cady, son of a pioneer Jackson county couple, Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Cady, was born in Des Moines township, Jackson county, November 7, 1880, where he grew to young manhood. March 6, 1903, he was united in marriage to Miss Cora Leach, the daughter of a neighboring family, and they immediately settled in Jackson. To their union was born four children, Mrs. LeRoy Koch of Austin, Earl R. Cady of Jackson, and Lowell, serving in the Marines in the South Pacific. A son Lawrence died in infancy.

While Mr. Cady was of quiet mannerisms, he always took a deep interest in matters that assisted his home community. He was a member of the First Presbyterian church, the Odd Fellows and Woodman lodges. He served the Jackson fire department as a faithful member for many years, being a member of the organization at the time of his death. His memory in his immediate home and in the circles of those with whom he associated, will be long revered.

Funeral services honoring the memory of Mr. Cady were held Wednesday afternoon from the Cady home on Sixth street at 2 o'clock, and from the First Presbyterian church at 2:30 o'clock, the service being in charge of the pastor, Rev. Paul B. Shedd. Interment, and many beautiful flowers was held in Riverside cemetery.
